# Future dark, Primate warns Poles

BERLIN — Poland's Primable has well and has been all for the Church in his communistrated country and called on Polish press to defend Church rights at any cost.

Cardinal Stefan Wastgrasky spoke in a letter to the nation's priests dated January 12, but only now reported here.

The Cardinal noted that the Church's difficulties are growing Church's difficulties are growing because of the "fighting, fanatic spirit of atheism (that) has arrived" and told priests to "prepare for the worst,"

He urged priests to resist government attacks on Church rights—increasingly severe in recent months—"even at the price of punishment, exile or loss of freedom."

THE LETTER said a campaign is now being waged to sow dissension among the country's 
priests and called for unity 
among then, "especially in view 
of the heavy and unusually difficult tasks which face the Polish 
clergy at the present time."

"A further attack against priests is expected," the Cardinal warned, whose aim will be "to undermine the confidence of Catholies in their priests and to divide priests into the more or less loyal and (to impose) financial restriction."

The letter also denounced the "renegade behavior" of some Pol-ish priests who, prompted by

THE HARVARD law professor cited Article 1, Section 8 of the Constitution on the powers of Congress to appropriate funds. "Congress can spend money on anything if wants," said Mr. Sutherland, "provided it is for the 'general welfare' and does not conflict with any other con-stitutional provision."

The only other provision with which it might conflict, he added, is the first Amendment to the Constitution which reads, in part: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..."

"This is not a black or white case. It is one of those things that cannot be answered categorically by turning to the Constitution."

Anti-semitism and anti-Catholicism are not altogether so fashionable as they used to be. Racial prejudice, too, is weakening. In fact, the only safe conversational gambit, just now, is anti-Communism.

Because our society very rightly abhors the aims and methods of Communist ideology, to apply the epithet "Communist" to a many run institution is a very serious matter; whether known shally or ignorantly or maliciously or, as as as the first the shall be the shall be shall be shall be shall be shall be shall be shall know so very well, the epithet is used freely by self-appointed and, if we may say so, self-righteous guardians of the common weal to quell those who may disagree with them on public issues or who may even have the temerity to ask questions and make controversy. Indeed, the word "controversial" has become interchangeable with "subversive" and "traitorous" in the minds of too many people, and the old, prideful spirit of the Know-Nothing party still roams the Land of the Free.

The latest target for our self-appointed vigilantes is the Foreign Policy Association, an organization exclusively concerned with widening the information and increasing the effectiveness of the democratic citizen whenever he comes to vote on a public issue.

As its major activity, the FPA prepares annually a set of materials for an eight-week discussion program and makes the sets available at a nominal charge to any individual or any community, urban, suburban or rural. The materials are completely factual. They present as many different aspects as possible of the questions for discussion. They point to no opinion but are simply presented to help the citizen form his very own opinion—accurately.

neip the citizen form his very own opinion—accurately.

Issued under the title Great Decisions, the materials were used by more than 250,000 citizens in more than 1,000 communities last year. They were also used extensively by 386 newspapers and 154 television and radio stations as a complement to the public service provided by daily journalism. This work of the FPA is supported financially by a long list of business concerns and other institutions, representing principally, a strongly conservative attitude to social questions. The list of the more prominent of our citizens who have written unequivocally expressing their approval of the FPA and its work includes the present President and the Vice President of the United States, the immediate past President and Vice President, former President Harry Truman and others, all with an admitted capacity for, as we hope we may say, reasonably shrewd observation.

Discussion groups, informed by Great Decisions ma-Discussion groups, informed by "Gear Decisions" normal briads are recommended on a national scale by the National Council of Catholic Women. They are being actively organized with much success by the Boston Archidocesan Council of Catholic Women; 150 groups are already existence throughout that Archidocese. They are already actively promoted in the schools by the Boston Archidoces and Superintendent of Schools, with the written support of Cardinal Cushing

In our own area, Great Decisions is sponsored by the Indianapolis Council on World Affairs and the materials are being used by many groups in the community. The project, however, has suddenly come under attack from persons, probably well-intentioned but certainly not fully informed, who have been turning up at community discussions. Their intention has been to stiffe the use of Great Decisions materials and, if that is necessary, to stifle all discussion with them.

The position of the attackers appears to be based principally on the finding of a runaway Grand Jury in Fulton County, Atlanta, Ga., which last spring ordered the suppression of the use in schools of Great Decisions materials because they were "institious and subversive."

### Is square dancing proper in Lent?

Q. Is it wrong to square dance during Lent?
My wife and I belong to a square dance club, and
it is our only recreation. Also my wife is one of
the officers of the club. There are several Catholic
couples in our club, We are converts; so we asked
one of these couples. They said a priest told them
it was all right as long as they didn't square dance
during Holly Week. We sked our pastor and he
told us to give it up. We don't know what to do
about it. Should we tell him other Catholic couples
what our pastor said?

A. There is no law which evolleithe footbile evol



A. There is no law which explicitly forbids you to dance during Lent. It is a season of penance and self-denial. What sacrifices are you making for his holy season? What extra good works are you doing? If you are fasting, saying extra prayers, and going to Mass each day, then keep on with your square dances, since they are your only recreation. Some of your pious friends who will criticize you, probably spend hours each day watching goofy and gory programs on TV. At least you get some exercise.

If you give it up during Lent, do so voluntarily in a spirit of sacrifice and penance.

Q. Are children under the age of 21 years, or adults over 59, allowed meat only once a day on days of fast? I know they must abstain on days of complete or partial abstinence.

A. Children under 21 and adults over 59 may have meat as often as they wish on fast days. They are not obliged to fast. As you rightly indicated, once they have reached the age of 7 they must abstain; so they may not have meat at all on Friday, and may have it only once—even as you and I—on days of partial abstinence.

Q. In our parish we don't have Stations during Lent. Instead we have Mass twice a day on Wednesday and Friday, in the a.m. and p.m. My question is, can one gain the Station indulgences by meditating on them in one's pew at Church?

Also can one gain the indulgences for them by saying them at home with a cross that has the Station blessing?

A. A person making the Way of the Cross alone, privately, must move from one Station to the ext in order to gain the indulgences.

next in order to gain the indulgences. In principle the same rule applies to a group or congregation making the Stations, even under the leadership of a priest, However, if the movement of the whole group from one Station to the next would give rise to disagreeable disturbance, then in a public exercise it is sufficient for one person (or the priest with his severes) to go from one station to the next—the congregation remaining in their pews, genuffecting at each Station, following the meditations, and saying the customary prayers.

The vocal prayers are not required—only a meditation at each Station—but vocal prayers are customary, especially when the devotion is made publicly.

Certainly you should not try to make the Way of the Cross during Mass—even by sitting in your pew, Follow the Mass and offer it with the priest; that is much more important. Then after the Mass is over you could make the Staelons in a few min-utes by going from one to the other, in proper order, with a short meditation at each.

A simple cross cannot be blessed for the Station A simple cross cannot be bisescal of the state indulgences; it must be a Crueifix, with the figure of Christ on it. You can gain the indulgences by using this Crieffix only if you are (1) on board ship, (2) in prison, (3) sick, or (4) living in an infidel region. The United States does not come under this last designation—technically.

### Q. Is there a Pope's Store Room in Rome, Italy, where the members of the D.C.C.W. send clothing for infants and children?

A. There may be; I do not know. But the clothing collected in the United States—especially during the Thanksgiving campaign—is stored in a large warehouse in New York, and shipped directly from there to the country where it is needed. The labor and cost of shipping is the biggest problem in handling this clothing. So it would not be sensible to ship it first to Rome, and then re-ship it to other parts of the world. Rome is not even a seaport. Shipment would have to be made to Naples, transferred to trains, unloaded, stored, reloaded on trains, and back again on ships, etc. Thus the costs of handling would exceed the value of the clothing.



In committing m sits pressed the opinion, in a column dated April 194, 1969, that the Air Force had been sold a bill of goods. The extent of community, I contended, has been grossly exaggerated.

To put it mildly, the reaction of some readers to this criticism of the Air Force manual was somewhat less than flattering. A number of correspondents wrote in no uncertain ternis that my defense of American Protestantism was simply appalling. Some of them said we had been unwittingly taken in by communist propaganda: others charged, in effect, that we were knowingly and deliberately peddling the communist line.

Mr. Roy Insits, however, that "Communist influence within the American churches is near the zero mark" at the present time and asserts that attempts to prove the contrary simply cannot be substantiated.

VATICAN CITY—True joy is based upon obedience to God's commandments, His Holiness Pope John XXIII told participants in a general audience here.

The Pope proposed the three words "joy, obedience and peace" for the meditation of all who attended the audience (Peb. 22). The joy which will continue for eternity, he said, "is contitioned upon obedience to the teachings contained in the Ten Commandents, by which we are commanded to honor the Almighty and not to offend him, and by which we are forbidden to harm our neighbor, to kill, to steal or to give false testimony."

Christ was the supreme example of obedience, the Pope said, becoming "bedient for us unto death, even to the death of the Cross." It is such obedience that God advays blesses, he added, even if one should commit an error in trying to follow the divine will.

"The consequence of obedience to God and His Holy Church, the Pope concluded, "is peace, tranquility and satisfaction of soul.

The same thing may be said of our relationship to God. If we disobey God in a matter of lesser importance, then it is not necessarily a denial of our love for God. Such an act of disobedience, in which the matter is not grave, we call a venial sin.
