Marian passes a milestone

QUESTION: Considering the past as prologue, what do you consider to be the pivotal decisions made during the first 25 years that have most greatly affected the direction of Marian College?

Sister Olivia: First of all, let me say, that when a decision is made, very often it does not at the time seem to be of lasting immade, very often it does not at the time scene to be of lasting im-portance. Sometimes to estating im-portance. Sometimes to establish it proves to laste been wise in the light of subsequent events. It is not always a purely administra-tive act. Credit must be given very often to the faculty for ad-vocating, cooperating and concur-ing with a decision.

UN bonds

The proposal that the country should take up \$100 million in United Nations bonds at two per cent is being subjected to some severe opposition in and out of Congress. The principal arguments right now seem to be based on the fact that Russia and some other nations are refusing to take part in the bond issue.

In spite of all the discussions about money, the matter is not really a financial one. After all, we are wealthy enough to be able to risk lending such a sum to a responsible organization like the United Nations, and can well afford the minor loss involved in setting the rate of interest at two per cent. at two per cent.

The matter is really one of whether the United Nations is worth supporting at all and whether we ought to take our part in supporting it. If we ought to support a nation that is not genough and independent enough to take its own decisions without reference to what Russia or any other nation does.

or any other nation does.

The bond issue was decided upon to help the United Nations over financial difficulties due to its efforts to produce peaceful and orderly conditions in the Congo. The total sum will be a charge on the United Nations Organization as a whole. It will be repaid out of the annual assessments paid by most member countries, including Russia. In this way, all the currently defecting countries will take part in the cost of the Congo operation eventually: that is, if they continue as United Nations members and pay their ordinary annual assessments as they have been doing.

If the bond issue fails for lack of adequate support, it will mean more than a financial problem. It will mean a severe, and possibly mortal, blow to the prestige of the United Nations. If we are so shortsighted as to want the United Nations to fail allogether and put an end to its existence, we might remember that a similar failure of the old League of Nations made World War II a certainty.

The United Nations, although intended to develop a state of constructive peace in the world, does not guarantee that peace. At the same time, and in spite of all its imperfections, it presents the only possible hope of an alternative to the disastrous nuclear arms race, a race that can have only one logical conclusion.

We want peace in the world. We say so on every suitable occasion. Lilly gift

We welcome the news of the gift of \$50,000 by the Lilly Foundation to Brebent School. Our welcome is all the more when we recall the gift of \$12,500 by the same foundation to Marian College not so long ago.

The gifts are encouraging for two reasons. The first is because they remind us that support for education is no less important at one level than another. The standard university education depends, in the final analysis, on the quality of students coming up from the high schools.

The second reason is that we feel sure the example of such an important institution as the Lilly Foundation will commend itself to other groups having at heart the interests of the community as a whole.

Catholic education, at grade school, high school and college level, gives invaluable service to the community. Its support bears heavily, and increasingly so, on the resources of the Catholic community. The evidence of the kindly—and practical—interest of the Lilly Foundation in what is being done is heartening to us all.

Independence

The Rev. John S. Banahan, director of the Radio and Television Office of the Archdiocese of Chicago, made an interesting point in his appearance before the recent hearings of the Federal Communications Commission. He referred to "the unusual situation that makes three out our four (Chicago) commercial stations owned and operated by networks whose offices are located in New York. . . . This situation severely limits the amount of local expression available to us."

Actually, the stutation in Chicago is not unusual. It is a commonplace throughout the whole country. Local radio and TV stations in every state do not express the particular culture of localities in this wonderfully varied society of ours. They are mere outlets for the few networks which operate on a national scale, whose programs must inevitably sacrifice quality and subtlety for the sake of quantity and broad appeal. (While saying this, we acknowledge the efforts of radio and TV stations in our own locality but we observe the efforts do not receive notable support from local buyers of advertising time.)


It is true that local resources in most states country.

It is true that local resources in most states cannot equal the technical excellence of productions emanating from a network operating on a national scale. But the importance of technical excellence in itself is over-rated. The cultural value, the freshness of Impact, the real interest to the different communities of programs of local origin are under-rated.

Local expression is limited in other ways. A well-known German composer has remarked on the prevalence of "packaged, New-Yorkized concert seasons which kill all local initiative." No young, talented concert artist can hope to make a respectable, if modest, reputation locally, as he might in most European countries. Either he establishes himself on a national scale, and through a New York agent, or not at all.

In the appraisal of painting, literature and most intellectual activity, 'bocal opinion either is disregarded or does not exist. We have become conditioned to look elsewhere (Continued on page 9)

Bishops' Relief

Sunday is Lactare Sunday—mid-Lent, when our thoughts of penance and penitential observances are mixed with joyful thoughts of the Redemption to come, when the Gospel for the day recalls the thoughtful remembrance of Our Lord for human meeds. It is appropriate that this should be the day appointed for the annual collection in aid of the American Bishops' Relief Fund.

To the pressing human needs in South American countries have been added those in the newly emergent countries of Africa. To the number of poor people uprooded from thehomes in Eastern Europe, in the Middle East, in Tibet, in North Korea, in Red China have been added those in South

East Asia, in the Congo, and now in nearby Cuba. The necessity for works of relief has increased enormously during recent years and the Bishops' Relief Fund finds itself maintaining 96 centers in 67 countries at an annual cost of \$5,000,000.

Compared with the total wealth of this great country, \$\$ million is not very much. It would scarcely buy one good passenger airplane. It is not very much either, when compared with the enormous amount of human misery in the world that is crying out not even for total remission but just for a little temporary alleviation.

However, it is consoling to know how very far the Bishops' Relief Fund stretches the \$5 million by severely economic administration and the intelligent use of available

resources. As our own Archbishop pointed out in his pas-toral letter last Sunday, for every single dollar subscribed, the Bishops' Relief Fund is able to put 400 lbs. of foodstuffs and 28 lbs. of medical supplies into the field.

This very effectiveness of our subscription dollar cannot fail to increase our sense of responsibility as we decide how much, in our judgment and conscience, we ought to give. It is obvious that whether we give one dollar or five, fifty cents or fifty dollars, every single cent is important and counts to a degree greater than we can normally imagine.

Charity and generosity bring grace to both the giver due to receiver. We owe it to ourselves no less than to "our neighbor" that we should give generously in 1962 to The Bishops' Relief Fund.

Pegler marriage case questioned

By MSGR. J. D. CONWAY

Q. I do not believe your answer in the Pegler case was very convincing. I was instructed that a marriage contracted by two baptized people (Catholic or not) performed by a religious (Catholic or not) constituted a valid marriage. Has my instruction been in error?

A: It certainly has. I am happy to straighten out errors of instruction, and to explain the marriage laws of the Church, even though these laws are intricate and hardly to be understood by anyone who has not studied them thoroughly. The annoyance I manifested in my previous answer results from the persistent habit of some of our Catholic people to question in shocked wonderment every "remarriage," which the Church permits to a person of prominent name: columnist, politician, or movie star. They demand to know how the Church can permit such marriage. Myerceas, if they knew even a bit of the law, they would realize that evidence in cases of this kind is usually intuined and personal, and cannot be divulged. Even an omnissient columnist can only guess at the nature of the case involved. Let's put it this way. Suppose you had been



can only guess at the nature of the case involved.

Let's put it this way, Suppose you had been
married and divorced: The Church has studied your
case and amassed a dossier of information, much of
it quite embarrassing to you. Then on the basis of
that evidence the Church gives you a declaration of
nullity. But your mosey neighbors demand to know
how, and why. Would you expect the Church to
reveal the sticky details just to satisfy their accusing

It is the nosey, distrusting gossip who annoys me. But now to your erroneous idea: A Catholic can be vailed married only before a priest. A. The rubries of the Missal before their recent revision, prescribed that a communion cloth he apread before the faithful who are receiving Holy Communion. Where there is a rail the cloth is draped over it; it must be of lines or bemp, and it must be clean. It is not to be held or handled in any way by the communicants. Certainly the hands should not be put under it. It is all right for the hands to be folided gently on top of it (N.B. It is not a cushion for elbows!)

Even though the new rubrics do not mention the communion cloth it is still prescribed by the Ritual and the Ceremonial of the Church, and by an instruction of the Congregation of the Sacrament given March 26, 1929, and never revoked.

Even when the communion cloth is used—and it should always be used—there must still be a communion plate, which is held by each communicant at the time he receives. (In practice this plate is often held by the altar boy.)

Q. Please give me some information on St. Sebastian, the martyr. And in particular, why he is the patron of athletes?

the patron of athletes?

A. When it comes to historical certainty we know very little about Schastian, except that he was a Roman martyr of the late Third Cochury, who was probably buried in the catacombs, near he present hasilica of St. Schastian. But there is an interesting and ancient legend about him, written a couple of centries after his death: he came from Narbonne in Gaul, but his family was from Milan; he joined the army so that he could work with the martyrs in Rome, help and encourage them. And he did it so well that he made many converts and worked numerous miracles. Even the governor of Rome hecame a Christian. And Schastian became much admired by the emperors Diocletian and Maximian, who made him a captain in the pretorian guards, and kept him regularly on duty around the palace.

But then persecution became rampant, and finally Sebastian was denounced to Dioclulan—who had not known that he was Christian. The emperor was very angry and had his ungrateful capitain shot by archers; but while the arrows went through him they did not kill him, though the soldiers left him for dead. After he had recovered he met Diocletian on the statiss of the palace and reproached him for his cruelty. It gave the poor emperor quite a fright, So this time he had Sebastian beaten to death.

St. Sebastian is indeed the patron of athletes—
precisely why I do not know. He is, of course, the
patron of archers, and of soldiers generally. The
reason is evident. He has been traditionally pictured as a young man of strength and grace; his
courage was clearly manifested—and he certainly
had extraordinary ability to "lake it." All that he
"dished out" was confidence, strength and perseverance which emanated from hiz own character
and faith.


